

SUBJECT: Determination Regarding Attendance at the National Aeronautic Association's Annual Robert J. Collier Award Dinner on June 12, 2008

On June 12, 2008, the National Aeronautic Association (NAA) will hold its annual Robert J. Collier Award Dinner and Presentation, at the Crystal Gateway Marriott in Arlington, Virginia. The NAA is a nonprofit organization that provides a forum for all members of the aviation/aerospace community to share information of common interest. The membership of NAA includes Congress, DoD, the FAA, NASA, aviation and aerospace manufacturers, airline officials, the media, and other individuals who have an interest in aviation. The Robert J. Collier Trophy is awarded annually "for the greatest achievement in aeronautics and astronautics in America, with respect to improving the performance, efficiency, and safety of air or space vehicles, the value of which has been thoroughly demonstrated by actual use during the preceding year."

The Robert J. Collier Award dinner will be a widely attended gathering of approximately 500 people from all sectors of the aviation community and government. Tickets to the dinner, valued at \$195 per person, are being offered to some NASA personnel at no cost. Although member corporations provide open seating at their tables to accommodate guests invited by NAA, the NAA is solely responsible for selecting, inviting, and seating of NASA guests.

I find that the dinner meets the requirements of a "widely attended gathering" as defined in 5 C.F.R. § 2635.204(g). I further determine that there is an Agency interest in having NASA personnel attend this event so that NASA invitees may attend the event without charge. Accordingly, NASA employees whose duties do not substantially affect NAA may accept an invitation for free attendance to the dinner for themselves and their spouses or guests.

NASA employees whose duties substantially affect NAA, for instance by way of procurement duties, should seek an individual determination regarding participation in this event from their local ethics counselor.
