SUBJECT: Determination Regarding Attendance by NASA employees at the IDGA 18TH

Annual Homeland Security Summit on March 26 – 27, 2025

On March 25 – 26, 2025, Institute for Defense Government Advancement (IDGA) will host a conference lunch at the Hilton Mark Center, 5000 Seminary Rd., Alexandria, VA. This event is to bring together leading experts from federal, local government, and industry stakeholders to address U.S. domestic security issues. IDGA is in control of planning and organization of this event.

Over 500 people have been invited to attend. Attendees will have a diversity of views or interests and will include Congressmen and staffers, state and local officials, representatives from industry, international agency partners, professional society representatives, research consortia representatives, employees of Federal agencies, and members of the public. The estimated cost of the event, including all food and beverages, is \$37.50 per person (per day). I have determined that there is an Agency interest in having NASA personnel attend the event because it will provide an opportunity for the invited persons to exchange information, ideas and views pertaining to NASA's policies, programs, and operations. I find that the event meets the requirements of a "widely attended gathering" as defined in 5 C.F.R. § 2635.204(g)(2).

NASA employees who do not have a significant role in a matter affecting the interests of the sponsors may accept an invitation for free attendance for themselves and a guest to the event. In those circumstances, I find that the Agency's interest in attendance outweighs any concern that the individual may be, or may appear to be, improperly influenced in the performance of their duties.

Additionally, NASA employees who have a significant role in any pending matter affecting the interests of IDGA such as procurement duties, program management, or negotiating or administering a Space Act Agreement, should seek a separate determination from their local ethics counselor as to whether they may accept the invitation.
